

Bertrand Dumont Director-General of the Treasury, from 12 January 2024

Bertrand Dumont began his career at the French Treasury, where he worked on sovereign debt restructuring within the Paris Club secretariat, and subsequently on government cash management within France's debt management office. He then spent 2 years as Alternate Executive Director for France at the International Monetary Fund in Washington.

In 2007, he joined the office of Christine Lagarde, Minister for the Economy, as international adviser, where he was responsible for the French Presidency of the European Union.

In 2010, he was appointed to the cabinet of Michel Barnier, European Commissioner for the Internal Market and Services, and worked on financial services regulation and reforms in the wake of the 2008 financial crisis. As part of this work, he was responsible for setting up the Banking Union. He set up his own practice in 2014.

After 2 years at HSBC Bank as Director in charge of prudential management, in May 2017 he was appointed Deputy Chief of Staff to Bruno Le Maire, Finance and Economy Minister.

He returned to the Treasury Directorate General in 2019 as Deputy Director General, working alongside Odile Renaud-Basso.

Since 2020, he has been Chief of Staff to Bruno Le Maire, Minister for the Economy, Finance and Industrial and Digital Sovereignty.

Bertrand Dumont is a graduate of the École normale supérieure and the École nationale d'administration, and holds an agrégation in history.
